Dear Commissioner Stewart:

The 2015 Florida Legislature passed proviso language in Specific Appropriation 105, providing the Standard Student Attire Incentive Fund. The Standard Student Attire Incentive Fund provides \$10 million for school districts to establish and implement a district-wide, standard student attire policy to promote safe and supportive learning environments and improve school safety and discipline pursuant to guidelines outlined by the Florida Department of Education (FLDOE).

Pursuant to the guidelines established by FLDOE, The School Board of Miami-Dade County, Florida, approved a mandatory, district-wide, standard student attire policy for students in grades k-8. The adopted standard student attire policy provides that the policy:


- Promotes a safe and supportive learning environments and improve school safety and discipline;
- Is a district-wide policy for all students in grades kindergarten through 8;
- Provides that charter schools are eligible to participate through the school district;
- May prohibit types or styles of clothing;
- May require solid colored clothing and fabrics for pants, skirts, shorts, or similar clothing, and short or long sleeved shirts with collars;
- Authorizes a small logo but may not authorize a motto or slogan;
- Provides parents to opt-out only for religious purposes or by reason of a student's disability; and
- Is in effect as of August 24, 2015, the first day of school for the 2015-2016.

Attached is a copy of the District Certification for 2015-2016 Implementation of District Standard Student Attire Policy and Verification of Compliance with Policy Guidelines, School Board Agenda Item D-72, and the approved School Board Policy 5511, Dress and Grooming.

Miami-Dade County Public Schools has had a uniform policy in place for since 1997. As a matter of fact, the district was asked to testify to the House Education Subcommittee on K-12 Committee regarding our policy during the 2015 legislative session. For the 2014-2015 school year, all of our elementary schools, middle schools, and K-8 centers wore uniforms.

**SUBJECT:** ADOPTION OF EMERGENCY POLICY: 5511- EP-2015-2016,  
No. 1, *DRESS AND GROOMING*

**COMMITTEE:** INNOVATION, GOVERNMENTAL RELATIONS, AND  
COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

**LINK TO STRATEGIC  
FRAMEWORK:** STUDENT, PARENT, AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

This item is presented to the Board to consider the proposed emergency adoption of the amendment to School Board Policy 5511, *Dress and Grooming*. As part of the 2015-2016 General Appropriations Act, the 2015 Florida Legislature allocated \$10 million for school districts to establish and implement district-wide standards student attire policy to promote safe and supportive learning environments and improve school safety and discipline.

To be eligible for funding, the district superintendent must certify to the Florida Department of Education that the district school board has implemented the approved district-wide standard student policy for the 2015-2016 no later than September 1. A district that voluntarily adopts and implements a district-wide standard student attire policy that meets the requirements established by the FLDOE is eligible to receive an incentive funding award of \$10 per student in kindergarten through grade 8 until the appropriated funds are depleted. The Florida Department of Education released guidelines for the implementation of the policy on Friday, July 24, 2015. Pursuant to the guidelines provided the attire policy:

- Must promote safe and supportive learning environments and improve school safety and discipline;
- Must be district-wide for all students in kindergarten through grade 8;
- May prohibit types or styles of clothing;
- May require solid colored clothing and fabrics for pants, skirts, shorts or similar clothing and short or long sleeved shirts with collars;
- May authorize a small logo but may not authorize a motto or slogan; and
- Must allow parents to only opt-out for religious purposes or by reason of a student's disability.

The policy is proposed to be renamed to *Dress Code and School Uniforms*. Attached are the Notice of Intended Action and the proposed policy amendment. Changes are indicated by underscoring words to be added and ~~striking through~~ words to be deleted.

It is recommended that The School Board of Miami-Dade County, Florida, adopt a district-wide uniform policy in Kindergarten through eighth grade in order to protect the safety and welfare of students attending our schools.

**REVISED GOOD CAUSE**

This policy is being submitted as an emergency adoption of a proposed amendment to School Board policy pursuant to the Florida Administrative Procedure Act, § 120.54(4), Fla.Stat. (2014). Emergency action is required in order to protect the health, safety, or welfare of students by mandating that students in Kindergarten through eighth grade wear school uniforms while attending public school in the school district of Miami-Dade County, Florida.

Authorization of the Board is requested for the Superintendent to undertake emergency rulemaking proceedings in accordance with the Administrative Procedure Act to adopt the amendment to School Board Policy 5511, *Dress and Grooming*.

This item does not appear on the published Agenda. There exists good cause to vary from the published Agenda in order to timely effectuate the changes by the legislatively prescribed deadline of September 1, 2015.

**RECOMMENDED:**

That The School Board of Miami-Dade County, Florida, adopt Emergency School Board Policy 5511-EP-2015-2016, No.1, *Dress Code and School Uniforms*, to be effective August 5, 2015.

**NOTICE OF INTENDED ACTION TO ADOPT EMERGENCY POLICY**

THE SCHOOL BOARD OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY, FLORIDA, announces the adoption of Board Policy 5511-EP 2015-2016, No. 1, *Dress Code and School Uniforms*, at its meeting of August 5, 2015.

**SPECIFIC REASONS FOR FINDING AN IMMEDIATE DANGER TO THE PUBLIC HEALTH AND WELFARE:** Requiring that students enrolled in Kindergarten through eighth grade wear school uniforms will serve to protect and enhance the safety and welfare of these students.

**REASONS WHY PROCEDURE IS FAIR UNDER THE CIRCUMSTANCES:** It is essential that emergency rulemaking be initiated to comply with legislative requirements involving mandatory school uniforms.

**PURPOSE AND EFFECT OF EMERGENCY POLICY:** In order to promote a safe and supportive learning environment and improve school safety and discipline, and to receive financial incentives offered by the Florida Legislature, the Board Policy 5511, *Dress and Grooming*, is proposed to be amended to require all students in grades K-8 to participate in a mandatory school uniform program. Policy and process provisions allowing schools to select the school uniform will not be changed and no-uniform days may be authorized by the principal for specific purposes such as fundraising, rewards, spirit days, and club days. Exemptions are provided for a student's sincerely held religious belief and when a parent requests a reasonable accommodation to address a student's disability. The proposed amendments include changing the title to *Dress Code and School Uniforms*.

**SUMMARY OF EMERGENCY POLICY:** Policy 5511, *Dress and Grooming*, is proposed to be amended to require all students in grades K-8 to participate in a mandatory school uniform program. Policy and process provisions allowing schools to select the school uniform will not be changed and no-uniform days may be authorized by the principal for specific purposes such as fundraising, rewards, spirit days, and club days. Exemptions are provided for a student's sincerely held religious belief and when a parent requests a reasonable accommodation to address a student's disability. The proposed amendments include changing the title to *Dress Code and School Uniforms*.

2 Students shall come to school clean and appropriately groomed and dressed.  
3 Students whose personal attire or grooming distracts the attention of other students  
4 or teachers from their school work shall be required to make necessary alterations  
5 before entering the classroom or be sent home by the Principal. Students who fail to  
6 meet the minimum acceptable standards of cleanliness and neatness as determined  
7 by the principal and as specified in this policy shall be subject to appropriate  
8 disciplinary measures pursuant to Policy 5500 Student Conduct and Discipline and  
9 the document, Code of Student Conduct, including suspension.

10 | **Dress Code**

11 | A. ~~This ere is a minimal District dress code. It is not intended to~~

3 **Mandatory Uniforms**

4 To promote a safe and supportive learning environment and improve school safety  
5 and discipline, all students in K-8 Schools shall be eligible to participate in a  
6 mandatory uniform program. Students in grades 9-12 may participate in a  
7 mandatory uniform program as follows:

8 A. For students in grades 9-12 only, A the school's Educational  
9 Excellence School Advisory Council (EESAC) may determine that a  
10 vote should be taken during the spring of any given year provided  
11 that notification of the intent to vote is submitted by February of the  
12 year in which the voting is to occur to the Regional Superintendent  
13 and the Deputy Superintendent, District/School Operations. Voting  
14 shall occur on a specific,  
15 advertised date(s) to be effective the following school year.

16  
17 At least fifty percent (50%) plus one (1) of the parents in that school  
18 who vote, must vote in favor of establishing a mandatory uniform  
19 program. This vote will stand for a minimum of three (3) school  
20 years, at which time the EESAC may determine if a subsequent vote  
21 is warranted.

22  
23 New senior high schools shall conduct an initial vote in the spring of  
24 their opening year, and thereafter, conduct votes according to the  
25 established procedures for all schools.

26 B. Every school participating in the mandatory uniform program The  
27 school shall establish a uniform committee that adequately  
28 represents administrators, teachers, students, and parents and  
29 follows guidelines promulgated by the Superintendent for selection  
30 of uniforms. The committee cannot select a uniform company as an  
31 "official uniform company" for a school. The committee can identify  
32 a uniform company as a "preferred" option but parents must be  
33 advised that the selected uniform or a generic option can be  
34 purchased from a variety of sources, such as other uniform  
35 companies, department stores, catalogs, etc. The uniform  
36 committee may determine whether the school logo patch will be  
37 required.

38 C. The school-selected uniforms may prohibit types or styles of clothing  
39 e.g., shorts, pants, dresses, and certain types of sweatshirts and  
40 jackets. The uniform chosen may consist of (1) solid colored clothing

1 | and fabrics for pants, skirts, shorts or similar clothing, and (2) short  
2 | or long-sleeved shirts with collars. The uniform also may include a  
3 | small logo but may not allow mottos or slogans and must comply  
4 | with all other provisions of this policy concerning appropriate attire.

5 | D. The uniforms selected shall not be characterized as gender-specific.

6 | E. The school shall provide for those students who, by reason of  
7 | financial hardship, cannot comply with the mandatory uniform  
8 | policy and notify parents of these provisions.

9 | F. Exceptions to wearing the uniform are permitted when:

10 | 1. Uniforms of a nationally recognized youth organization such  
11 | as the Boy Scouts or Girl Scouts are worn on regular meeting  
12 | days.

13 | 2. A student wears a button, armband, or other accouterment to  
14 | exercise the right to freedom of speech as guaranteed by the  
15 | First Amendment unless they signify or are related to gangs,  
16 | gang membership, or gang activity.

17 | 3. Wearing a school uniform violates a student's sincerely held  
18 | religious belief.

19 | 4. A student's parent requests a reasonable accommodation to  
20 | address a student's disability.

21 | 5. The principal has authorized a "no-uniform" day as a  
22 | fundraiser or reward. The principal may also authorize club  
23 | shirt or uniform days, and school or community spirit days,  
24 | in which the mandatory school uniform will not be required.

- 1                   1.    A request may be made in writing or in person by the parent  
2                   for an Application for Exemption from the Uniform Program

10 J. The School Board is immune from any civil liability resulting from

12 **Standards for ~~e~~Evaluating the ~~a~~Appropriateness of ~~d~~Dress/~~g~~Grooming ~~are as~~**

14 A. A student with hair of such length or style that it creates classroom  
15 or school disorder, or distracts the attention of another student or  
16 students in any class in session from the lesson being presented or  
17 from any other assigned classroom activity, or which creates a safety  
18 or health hazard for any student in a classroom will be required to  
19 change the length or style of the hair. Failure on the part of a  
20 student to comply with this requirement shall result in disciplinary  
21 measures which may include suspension from school.

22 B. A student who wears items of clothing which, because of fit, design,  
23 color, texture, inadequate coverage, or some other factor, create  
24 classroom or school disorder or distract the attention of another  
25 student or students in any class in session from the lesson being  
26 presented or from any other assigned school activity, or which create  
27 a safety or health hazard for any student in school, shall be required  
28 to change the clothing to eliminate the disorder, distraction, or  
29 hazard. Failure on the part of a student to do so shall result in  
30 disciplinary measures which may include suspension from school.

31 C. A student who fails to maintain personal cleanliness, grooming, or  
32 neatness of dress which creates classroom or school disorder or  
33 distracts the attention of others from assigned classroom activity  
34 will be required to maintain a level of personal cleanliness,  
35 grooming, or neatness of dress that eliminates the disorder or the  
36 distraction of other students. Failure to do so shall result in  
37 discipline which may include suspension from school.

38 D. Articles of clothing that cause excessive maintenance problems of  
39 school property -- for example, shoe cleats that scratch floors or tear  
40 rugs, trousers with metal rivets that scratch furniture -- are not

1 after being instructed to do so by school employees are subject to  
2 discipline which may include suspension from school.

3 The time, the specific location, the type of activity going on, and whether the alleged  
4 offense is the first or repetitious on the part of a student must all be considered  
5 when disciplining a student. The primary consideration is correction of a problem  
6 by the quickest and most reasonable method so that the instructional program for  
7 students may proceed with the least possible disruption.
